Located in the northwest corner of Connecticut, Litchfield County is the largest county of the state in terms of area with the smallest population of counties in the state. Its picturesque rural scenery is punctuated by quintessential New England towns each with its own character and history. Our Northeast district gathering will take you on a loop through the Litchfield Hills to visit some of the finest examples of its towns and villages from Litchfield to Falls Village, from Woodbury to Washington.

The town of Litchfield is known for many illustrious citizens through the centuries from Ethan Allen, leader of the Green Mountain Boys during the American Revolution, to Judge Tapping Reeve who established the young nation's first law school here, to Harriet Beecher Stowe, abolitionist and author of *Uncle Tom's Cabin*. Falls Village is the most northern town we will visit and is well worth the ride. Located on the Housatonic River at the falls, the Appalachian Trail runs through this quaint village. Washington is the site of our gathering on Friday and was home to abolitionist Frederick Gunn who established this eponymous prep school and who is also credited with opening the first summer camp here in 1861. Architect Ehrick Rossiter, a graduate of the Frederick Gunn School, settled in Washington and is best known for establishing a summer colony of notables who resided in his Queen Anne or shingle style "summer cottages" in this quiet town.

We hope you will enjoy this chance to reconnect with Herb Society members from around our district and beyond. The following have worked hard to make this a memorable experience in a most sensational part of our district. We hope to see you there!

- Interior designer and author, Bunny Williams' 15 acre estate in Falls Village with apple orchard, greenhouse, vegetable and herb garden, woodland walk. Tour the barn with library and conservatory at your leisure.
- The Sumacs, a spectacular garden on nine acres, features a beautifully restored 1894 Ehrick Rossiter home. Formal potager, cutting garden, orchard and spectacular perennial border surrounded by woods, shade gardens and pathways.
- Highlights of Brush Hill Gardens include a rose walk, moon garden, perennial borders and a hillside woodland garden with cascading waterfall and rills. Brush Hill Gardens' owners respectfully request that visitors to their garden be vaccinated for Covid 19.
- Created on the site of an old farm, Appledore has grown over two decades into a multi-acre idiosyncratic garden of beds, meandering paths and unexpected destinations. A collector's garden with unique specimens and many old favorites.
- A lovely formal town garden on the outskirts of the village of Litchfield. Shrubs, perennials and herbs are abundant in sequential garden rooms and borders adjoining the historic circa 1771 home.
